Students Spend 2 Weeks in New Mexico with the Pueblos

This past July, **Sr./Dr. Donna Marie Gould, SBS,** offered **Xavier University of Louisiana** students the opportunity to study literature written by Native Americans as a bridge between oral cultures and literate cultures followed by experiencing the Native American Pueblo Culture of New Mexico.

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

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St. Katharine Drexel's connection:

Xavier University of Louisiana and the Pueblos of New Mexico

Educators have moments when they stand back, observe a class event and reflect, "This is education at its best." Then there are even greater moments when one reflects and observes that "something sacred is happening here."

My life as an SBS (Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament) has converged paths in creating a new course at Xavier University of Louisiana (XULA). FOUNDATION OF NATIVE AMERICAN LITERATURE is a study of literature written by Native Americans as a bridge between oral cultures that preserve and transmit knowledge through rituals, ceremonies, song, chants, drumming, pottery, weaving, and literate cultures who communicate and understand the world through the technology of written language. I spent ten years in the Southwest at St. Catherine Indian **School** in Santa Fe working, living, and sharing in the Native American's way of life by being immersed in the ceremonies/rituals of the surrounding Pueblos. For the last thirty years, I have been at Xavier University as a faculty member in the English Department. I have often said that my soul has taken root with the people and the land of New Mexico; however, my heart is at home at Xavier.

This XULA/Pueblo experience has united both my passions as two of Mother Katharine's missions met and embraced.

Foundations of Native American Literature

began in the classroom at XULA with the study of Asiatic Migration across the Bering Strait into the Americas 14,500 years ago. The story of this ancient journey refocused on the Native tribes in the U.S. today and finally narrowed the lens to the Pueblos of the Southwest. Following the classroom study, the students and I traveled to New Mexico to share an experience with the Pueblo people. The travel and accommodations were sponsored by XULA's alumni who were enthusiastic about this experience that connected **St. Katharine Drexel** – *Xavier's foundress*, and her first mission (1894) in the Southwest.



XULA students joined Sr. Patrick Marie Dempsy, SBS, who became their Pueblo guide and mentor during their visits to the Jemez and Santa Domingo Pueblos.

When we arrived in New Mexico, my role shifted from teacher to door opener. Our first visit was at the Laguna Pueblo. The SBS Sisters, both Natives of Laguna were hospitable and loving. The students were greeted by Sr. Consolata Beecher, SBS and Sr. Rosita Shiosee, SBS with welcoming hugs and a snack of fruit and cinnamon rolls. Sr. Consolata shared her stories about her life growing up in Laguna, her SBS experiences in the inner cities, and her life now that she has returned to Laguna. Sister then guided us around the Pueblo. On our return to the convent, Sr. Rosita gave us a tour of the church and told stories full of history and wisdom. Time passed far too quickly, and we concluded our visit with a wonderful lunch resembling a feast, prepared and set up by the Sisters. The conversation and sharing during this meal provided a dramatic and wonderful closing to the day.

Each evening when we returned to Santa Fe, we met to reflect on the day. The students shared their love for the Sisters. One student summarized the experience at Laguna: "When we first arrived at Laguna, I was hesitant about entering this new world. After the Sisters greeted us and told us their stories, I felt right at home." Other students reflected on how Sister Consolata's stories were like the ones that their grandparents told about their ancestors and their

values as a community. Others reflected on Sr. Rosita's stories that were echoed in those told by their aunts and other family elders. They were mesmerized by Sister's tales and loved her as a storyteller. The students all agreed that they came in anticipation of meeting a culture unlike one they have experienced and ended up feeling right at home.

This connection was what I had hoped would happen as we continued to experience Pueblo life; however, it was amazing that this feeling of being at home happened on our first day visiting the Sisters at Laguna.

The next major experiences was attending the feasts at Jemez and Santa Domingo Pueblos. Sr. Patrick Marie Dempsey, SBS became our Pueblo guide and mentor. Sister has been in the Southwest at St. Michaels in Arizona with the

Navajos and St. Catherine's in Santa Fe with numerous



tribes for over 50 years. She has earned love and respect as a teacher, principal, administrator and most evident as "their Sister."

At the feast, the students observed the ancient and sacred corn dances. The students were amazed at the 500 Pueblo people dancing into the plaza painted in orange-reddish clay as the pumpkin clan. Immediately following the first dance another 500 dancers came

into the plaza painted in blue-green clay, the Turquoise

Clan. They observed what **St. Katharine Drexel** must have experienced at these dances over 125 years ago – watching these Pueblo dancers painted in blue, green, red and orange clay, it seemed as if the earth stood up to dance.

After watching the dances, **Sister Patrick Marie** took us to visit many Pueblo homes to take part in the

traditional meals offered to all visitors who came to celebrate with them. Home after home, the students observed the love and welcome that Sister Patrick Marie received as we sat down to a meal. Sister was introduced to other visitors as *the former principal of their school*, **St. Catherine's**, or "*this is my teacher*" and the best "*this is my Sister*." These men and women who were greatgrandparents spanning the generations to young parents who knew Sister treated her with the same love and

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

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respect that she gives to them. The Xavier students were greeted as part of their family related through St. Katharine. At each greeting, there were questions and stories about other SBS who had made a difference in their life. After many hours at the feasts, we were exhausted and started home; however, Sister Patrick Marie stayed in the Pueblo village because she had many more families that she had promised to visit. The students were astounded and inspired by Sister's energy, dedication and love for the people of the Pueblos.



That evening as we met to reflect on the day, the students spoke of being deeply touched by the dances and grateful for our guide and mentor. The students agreed that the image of Sr. Patrick Marie watching the dances, standing silently and reverently for a long period of time in the unrelenting sun, she seemed to become part of the ceremony.





As part of their visit to the Pueblos, Dr. Donna Marie Gould, SBS and her students got to witness some of the ritual dances of the Native Americans in New Mexico.

After visiting other Pueblos and a tour of the Ancestral Pueblo dwellings at Bandelier National Monument, our closing experience was at the Pueblo Cultural Center in Albuquerque owned by the nineteen Pueblos of New Mexico. One major exhibit featured the life and legacy of Bob Chavez, a famous artist from the Pueblo of Cochiti. He dedicated his life to St. Catherine's Indian School as a promise to God after his safe return from the Bataan Death March during WWII. Sr. Consolata Beecher, SBS, was instrumental in creating and developing this exhibit. The students were proud to see to see the founder of their University, St. Katharine Drexel, highlighted in this section of the Center.

In many places in Santa Fe and in Pueblo homes, Saint Katharine's image was displayed. This was a major connection between the Pueblos and the students from Xavier.

As I reflect on this experience, I look around the many tables of the Pueblo people where the students were sharing a meal and engaging in deep conversations, and I know that this was more than an educational experience; this was a celebration of Eucharist.

How proud Mother Mary Katharine must be of all of her Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament who followed her and created the pathway from the Pueblos of NM to Xavier University of Louisiana culminating in a celebration of love.

I am sure Mother Katharine is smiling in love at Xavier's alumni and students, and for the generations of Pueblo peoples who still speak her name with respect and honor her passion for justice. Yes indeed, something sacred happened here.



Sr. Marianne was invited to assist in helping achieve academic success for the students by Sr. Sandra Smithson, SSF, a product of SBS education. Much like St. Katharine Drexel, whom Sr. Sandra shares a great love and devotion to, she wished to create a school setting wherein minority students could receive the same type of excellent education like she received from first grade through her college years from the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament (SBS).



When asked, "How does collaboration and working together with others benefit your ministry?", Sr. Marianne responded... "During this time of limited resources of the SBS, this collaborative effort has enabled me to continue the mission and charism of [her order's foundress], St. Katharine

Drexel." She further credits Sr. Sandra Smithson, SSF with making her feel "continually supported and encouraged in her SBS vocation."

Initially, when Sr. Marianne entered the Novitiate in 1961 and later took her final vows in 1964, she didn't initially think about teaching, however once she became involved with it, she truly "loves it, which is the reason why [she] is still involved with it." Sister hopes to continue her ministry work as long as possible.

There are two School Sisters of St. Francis and an associate living and working with Sr. Marianne. Her school day typically begins at 7:30 a.m. and ends at 3:30 p.m., and Sr. Marianne notes that...

St. Katharine Guides Sugar Grove Associates

A historical chapter overview from Gary and Kathy Scott, ASBS

In the Spring of 2013, seven dedicated individuals committed to continuing the vigorous spirit of St. Katharine Drexel, whose heart and desire was constantly directed toward the poor, the outcasts, and those unjustly treated. Mother Katharine's vision, and close union with Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament gave her constant and renewed energy to take up the cross in loving mission to Native and African Americans. Since this first group, our ASBS Faith Community has grown to now include fifteen associates.

Our group has had many instances where we believe **St. Katharine Drexel** has intervened in our service life, and we truly believe she is present in the everyday lives of our parishioners.

As an example, while we were searching to find a mission for our first years' service project, our newest Associate, Kathleen Malone, told us of her relative that had been among the founding priests at one of the oldest Indian missions in St. Francis, South Dakota. The American Indian Museum on the site named in his honor! The original school was dedicated in 1886 through the charity and foresight of our patroness St. Katharine Drexel, currently aiding nine (9) Native American Catholic parishes serving the Native American Lakota on the Rosebud Reservation.

Following in the spirit of St. Katharine Drexel whose heart and desire was constantly directed toward the poor, the outcasts, and those unjustly treated.

While attempting to determine our second years' service project, "We received an edition of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament magazine, Mission," says Kathy Scott, ASBS. "In this issue was an article titled 'Red Lake Nation' describing the history, culture, and difficulties of the Native American Ojibwa at St. Mary's Mission and School on the reservation. It seemed that St. Katharine was giving us a pretty powerful hint, and we all agreed there certainly was great need there."

The third year, Julie Gilbert, another newly added Associate, was found to have a relationship with another South Dakota Lakota Sioux Mission in Pine Ridge, and we selected Our Lady of Lourdes School there as a recipient. "When Julie described the history, culture, and difficulties of the Mission and School on the reservation, we were certain this is where our efforts that year were needed." says Kathy. Our Associates then decided that we would continue to aid these three Missions each year, sending a majority of items to one on a rotating basis, and sending smaller amounts to each of the others as well.

The Sugar Grove Associates, along with Aurora Central Catholic High School, recently completed our fifth annual service project, providing over 1,100 pounds of notebooks, binders, paper, pens, pencils, crayons, markers, office supplies, art supplies, and \$500.00 in monetary support to St. Mary's School and Mission, one of the oldest Indian missions in Minnesota, founded in 1888 with the assistance of our dear Patroness.

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Associates in Action Sugar Grove, Illinois

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Many of you may not know this, but the original historic Church at Red Lake burned to the ground in an overnight fire December 2, 2017, and the congregation has committed to, and begun the rebuilding process. Our Parish responded almost immediately with gifts of vestments, crucibles and other useful mass items.

Janet Backus, 2018 ASBS Project Chair, related that "St. Mary's list of needs had all the usual items, but Principal Michael Hougan requested board games suitable for Pre-K, Kindergarten and First Grade, and the Reading Specialist sent a list of specific books that would be useful also. Our parishioners responded and we received board games, Legos, wooden blocks and we GOT BOOKS!!!!"



Tom and Mae Ernst, joined our newest Associate, Barb Rauscher and her husband Jack, in delivering the items personally to St. Mary's Mission and School in two packed to the ceiling vans. Barb has relatives in the area of the Mission, and knew just how to get there. She said that, "We have a very generous faith community here at SKD, who understand the Charism of St. Katharine Drexel and her Daughters in faith."

Our group here at **St. Katharine Drexel Parish** in **Sugar Grove, Illinois** has many more instances where we believe **St. Katharine Drexel** has interceded in our service and daily life, and we truly believe she is present in the everyday lives of our parishioners as they exhibit her "joyful spirit." Many of you have similar stories, and I have heard a few first hand from Associates at the **Pilgrimage** and **World Meeting of Families** in Philly. But, I think many of you reading this will agree that it has been a very difficult time for some Associates as they struggle with the reality of the closing of the Motherhouse, movement of many of the Sisters into a retirement facility, and the lack of daily access to **Saint Katharine's** tomb. Personally, it had left me with a "void" of a type I just couldn't quite name.

Updates from our ASBS

However, prayer has brought me the realization that **St. Katharine** is constantly with us, speaking to Our Lord on our behalf. Soon the tomb of our dear **St. Katharine** will again be available to an even larger Catholic community, as it is now open to the public at the **Cathedral Basilica of SS. Peter and Paul in Philadelphia.**

Within our own ASBS Faith Community, several Associates have regular communication with some of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament (SBS), many who have recently relocated to Paul's Run Retirement Community. Many of the Sisters are involved in new ministries, and all are a powerhouse of prayer and support for their religious community, SBS Associates (ASBS), SBS Alumni, and many friends and benefactors. Perhaps you, too, have a special relationship with one of our dear SBS. What a joyous time this is as St. Katharine Drexel's tomb is installed at the Cathedral Basilica for greater access to the public.

Whom will she touch next? What miracles still await?

Mother Katharine Drexel once said...

"I wish to be one who conscientiously takes part in the unfolding of God's Plan..."

I truly believe that this is now her Saintly life's work, and as Associates, ours as well.

A Testament in Believing that God Leads Us Through **Every** Challenge if We Trust in Him



The NBCCC, National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus was formed 50 years ago to improve the lives of Black Catholics by giving a voice to the African American community, celebrating their giftedness, transforming those minds clouded in racism, and encouraging others to share their gifts for the betterment of the universal Catholic Church.

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Formed during the civil rights movement, the **NBCCC** membership includes Black Catholic ordained clergy (priests and permanent deacons), religious brothers and seminarians. It later became a catalyst for other like organizations. The National Black Catholic Clergy Caucus provides leadership training and mentoring for seminarians, deacons and religious brothers during their formation process. It is a fraternity for the Black Catholic Clergy and Religious which serves to support the spiritual, theological, educational and ministerial growth of its members.













Did You Know?

The SBS & The Influenza Epidemic in 1918

The excerpt is from the article, "Saint Peter Claver Church and School, Philadelphia, PA: A Collaborative Effort," American Catholic Studies, vol. 128:1 (2017) written by Stephanie Morris, Ph.D.

During the Influenza epidemic of 1918, when schools were closed, St. Peter **Claver School was made an Emergency** branch of Frederick Douglass Memorial **Hospital. Ten Sisters provided nursing** at the Municipal Hospital and three at the Douglass Emergency hospital. 33 **Mother Katharine noted that eighteen** SBS were nursing in Philadelphia. "Some nurse in Municipal Hosp., some at St. P. Claver's adjunct of Douglass Hosp., some have rows of 60 houses of poor." 34 They welcomed all comers: Asian, European, American, and Black. This was not a decision made casually. According to the vows pronounced by each Sister at that time, they promised to "be the Mother and Servant of the Negro and Indian Races . . . nor shall I undertake any work which may tend to the neglect or abandonment of the Indian and Colored Races." In an earlier letter to Most Reverend Patrick J. Ryan, Archbishop of Philadelphia, Mother Katharine elaborated on this: "'Indian and Colored' are to be our chief care: that our work must be for them; but this does not exclude our helping the white race in cases of necessity." 35 As misery knew no color, neither did the instructions from the Archbishop and from Mother Katharine. **Louise Drexel Morrell gave the Sisters** \$500 to use for the afflicted. While Mother Katharine was in Santa Fe, the General Council offered to wash the **Bristol Emergency Hospital clothing for** three days (in the Motherhouse's Laundry), "if it was sterilized."

March 3, 2018 was a regular, scheduled mass at the Basilica Cathedral Saints Peter and Paul in downtown Philadelphia, however for the religious order of the Sisters she founded, the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament (SBS), the ASBS (Associates of the SBS), and St. Katharine Drexel's devotees, the mass was a special way to recognize the accomplishments of this great woman who worked tirelessly throughout her lifetime as "an apostle for social justice."

Pastor and Rector of the Cathedral, Rev. Gerald Dennis Gill, spoke about St. Katharine's missionary spirit in his welcome address. President of the SBS, **Sr. Donna Breslin** challenged attendees to live by the saint's example to speak up for justice & human rights, and to continue her mission to assist the marginalized amongst them.



The Process of Moving the Sacred Remains of St. Katharine Drexel Begins



St. Katharine Drexel's sacred remains translated to Cathedral, August 2018.

A link for updates was released.

July 24, 2018, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia announced the beginning of a period of prayer — preparing for the arrival of St. Katharine Drexel's holy relics later in the year, and the start of preparations underway for St. Katharine's body to be transferred to the Cathedral Basilica. The initial projected date for visitors to be able to visit her tomb again was sometime in September, however, things took a bit longer to accomplish than initially thought.

At a press conference held on Aug. 17, 2018, Rev. G.

Dennis Gill, pastor and rector of the Cathedral Basilica of
Saints Peter and Paul, was joined by Sr. Donna Breslin,
President of the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, to formally
announce that St. Katharine's sacred remains had been
translated from the congregation's Motherhouse property in
Bensalem, PA to the Cathedral. You can view Channel 3's


Rev. Gill noted, "The Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament have once again given the faithful of the Archdiocese a tremendous gift," and continued to state, "With the new opportunity to honor Saint Katharine at the Cathedral, even more people will be exposed to her extraordinary life and example. It is our fervent hope that others will be inspired and continue her important work among Native Americans and African Americans."

Sr. Donna told the reporters present, "Saint Katharine's message is as relevant today as it was 125 years ago. She is a contemporary saint and we continue to pray to her, for an end to racism and other deeply rooted injustices."

A generous grant from the Connelly Foundation underwrote the tomb translation and construction, and it will also provide the implementation of new communications and an education program about the Saint.

Oct. 30, 2018, the tomb of St. Katharine was officially presented to the public along with an announcement that it would be available for veneration and prayer by the faithful now that it was installed. Further enhancements will continue beyond the Mass of dedication on November 18, 2018 officiated by Philadelphia Archbishop Charles J. Chaput, O.F.M., Cap. Mary, the daughter of Margaret McNamara and Thomas Ryan was baptized at the family parish four days following her birth in County Tipperary, Ireland.

In 1935, following a trip to promote vocations by Mother Mercedes and Sr. Brendan, Mary chose to join them and travel across the ocean to become a missionary. This was something many young Catholic women of Ireland also chose to do at that time.

Mary arrived in Cornwell Heights on September 9, 1935, and she finished out three years of her basic academic work prior to starting her training as a postulant. In 1941, now called Sr. Maureen Patricia, she pronounced her first vows.

Sister Maureen Patricia had a quiet manner and quick smile which endeared her to the many students she taught over her long lifetime. This included assignments in Georgia, Texas, New York and Arizona, She also served as a school Principal in the states of Ohio, California and Missouri throughout her ministry.

Beginning in 1986, Sister assumed the leadership position of Director of the Imani Center at St. Ignatius Parish in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania until she returned to the Motherhouse in 2003.

Sister Maureen Patricia's lighthearted spirit was greatly enjoyed by the aides and nursing staff who cared for her over the years. She glowed on the day of her 100th birthday celebration, surrounded by her fellow SBS, politicians, the media and three special visitors from Ireland — her nephews, Noel, Kevin & Ted Roberts. They brought photos from her family in Ireland to share with her, and helped Sister to read her cards.

As her health declined, her 101st birthday was a much quieter celebration. During the late evening of March 18th, Sr. Maureen Patricia quietly answered the call of her spouse to come Home. As Father Babowitz lead the prayers at her burial, the sunshine was reminiscent of the brightness of Sister's happiness in heaven.



Sr. Carolyn Hodos, SBS Apr. 23, 1938 ~ Mar. 19, 2018 Amen, Allelulia!

Carolyn was one of three children born to Joseph Hodos and Josephine Masauskas of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She had a brother, Jim, and a sister, Linda. Carolyn was baptized three weeks after her birth

and attended elementary school at St. Catherine's followed by St. Anne's. She spent her first two years of high school at St. Francis Academy and in 1954 she came to the motherhouse where she completed the final years of her high school education.

Upon becoming a novice, she received the religious name of Sr. Marie Josette, and pronounced her first vows on March 9, 1957. She remained on the motherhouse grounds to take additional courses before starting her first mission in Sept. 1959 at St. Mark the Evangelist in the Harlem area of New York City where she taught first grade. While there, she was recognized for implementing the *Workshop Way* method with her students and parents.

Sister Carolyn professed her final vows in 1963, then taught the next five years at St. Ignatius in Philadelphia. Sister went on to teach and tutor at other schools in Philadelphia, New York, and Alabama. She also earned a Bachelors degree in 1971 from Villanova University.

In the late nineties, Sr. Carolyn contributed to the community life of the Sisters and to the educational development of the children in the northeastern United States. In 2001, her tutoring was a source of encouragement to both the children and their parents of Our Lady of Fatima School in Birmingham, AL.

Eight years later she returned to the motherhouse as a resident of St. Michael Hall. Sister transitioned to Paul's Run in April 2017 along with other Sisters, however, shortly after the move she was placed on hospice care. On the feast of her patron saint and that of her parents, Sr. Carolyn peacefully slipped away to join her Lord who had won her heart so long ago.



Sr. M. Catherine Joseph Bennett, SBS Apr. 2, 1927 ~ Jun. 20, 2018 Deo Gratias

When interviewed in Mission Magazine in 2004, Sr. M. Catherine Joseph Bennett credited her own faith to the "deep faith her parents, [Catherine Gallagher from Donegal and Michael Bennett from Armagh],

brought from Ireland." The two married in Philadelphia and raised ten children, among which were three sets of twins. Rosemary, her birth name, and her twin sister, Jane, were the last set, 6th and 7th in birth order.

Rosemary received her elementary education at Holy Name School and her latter years at John W. Hallahan Catholic Girls High School. She was a member of the band and a flutist for four years; something she greatly enjoyed doing. During this time she met some of the SBS and often attended Holy Hour at the Shrine of the True Cross. However, it was during a presentation to her class by the SBS that she heard about the missionary work with Blacks and Native Americans, and in her words became "enraptured." Rosemary shared that she wanted "to join the SBS immediately," but those plans had to wait two more years for her to finish her schooling. Despite her extreme enthusiasm, she followed her mother's advice to experience the work world where she worked as a stenographer on weekdays. On the weekends she attended USO dances.

On January 6, 1948, Rosemary answered the call to the religious life that she had long been attracted to by entering the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. In 1950, she pronounced her vows and received her black veil.

Sister Mary Catherine Joseph earned a Bachelor's Degree in Education in 1959. She taught for many years until later in her ministry work, she called upon her secretarial skills to work in the Vocations Office.

In early 2017, Sr. Catherine Joseph moved to Paul's Run and cheerfully enjoyed her daily activities. Early on June 20, 2018, Sister's health took a significant change, and she sadly and unexpectedly met her Savior.



Sr. Therese Misencik, SBS Jan. 4, 1929 ~ Jun. 30, 2018

God Alone

Born in Cleveland, Ohio in 1929, Sr. Therese Misencik grew up in the nearby suburb of Lakewood where her father, Joseph Misencik was born. Her mother, Lucy Zvolencak, a native of Cleveland, married her

father in 1923, and raised a family of five girls and one boy. Sister was baptized at the the family's parish of Saints Cyril & Methodius, and completed her elementary schooling there. She graduated from St. Theresa's Academy in 1947.

Therese's desire for ministry among African Americans led to her entrance into the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament that September. The following summer, she was received as a novice and took the religious name of Sr. Martin Anthony. She professed her first vows in July 1950 and her perpetual vows in the summer of 1955, receiving the ring with her motto: *God Alone*.

Sisters early ministry years were spent in education teaching mostly in the N.E. region. She earned her Bachelors Degree of Science in Education in 1957 from Villanova University. In 1968, she taught in her home town at St. Adalbert's in Cleveland, before heading to Chicago to be the principal at St. Elizabeth's in 1969.

In 1972, she was missioned out west to teach at St. Catherine Indian School in Santa Fe, NM. While teaching at St. Bridget of Erini in St. Louis, MO in 1975, she also earned her Master's Degree in Education from St. John College in Cleveland.

Sister had a love of reading that she shared with others. She loved to tell her students, "readers are leaders." Before returning to the motherhouse, she also worked as a librarian, after earning a degree in library science from Villanova in 1988. While at the motherhouse she collected books for needy students, assisted with prison ministry, organized raffles to raise money for medical procedures for children in developing countries, worked in the convent library, guild office and in archives. Her presence is missed by the many who knew and loved her, most especially her family.

Sr. Marianne Poole, SBS, a native of Philadelphia, is in her 6th year of ministry at the Smithson-Craighead **Academy**, the premier charter school established in the Nashville Metro School area by Sr. Sandra Smithson, SSF, (a previous St. Katharine Drexel National Justice award recipient) and her sister, Mary Craighead.

The school day begins early at 7:30 a.m. for Sister in the 4th grade classroom where she works with a student population of primarily African American and Hispanic American lowperforming students. The dedicated staff at the Tennessee charter school is a group of lay people committed to the mission of **Project Reflect** - the 501C umbrella for the school. *Project Reflect* was initially founded in 1992 to serve children living in poverty and to help transform urban America through education and education reform.
